I am contacting parents and carers to let them know about our new campaign to “Keep your child safe online”. Ofcom data suggests that many parents find it difficult to know when or how to talk about online safety to their children because quite often it’s a world that they feel they know little about. The internet and social networking are now very much a part of everyday life; we must recognise and respond to this reality.

The North Yorkshire Safeguarding Children Board and the NSPCC are working in partnership to deliver a campaign in North Yorkshire which will give parents and carers reliable, credible and pragmatic support to enable them to have conversations with their children about how to stay safe online.


We are also looking to running information sessions which will enable parents and carers to find out more and discuss the issues with other parents, carers and
