Curriculum Intent

At Sutton on the Forest Primary School we strongly believe in the power of reading and believe it is the building block to future academic success. At our school we use a wide range of stories, poems, rhymes and non-fiction texts that develop pupils' vocabulary, language comprehension and love of reading.

To promote a love of reading at Sutton on the Forest we:

- *Create class libraries/book corners which are inviting, well organised and contain a range of quality texts.*
- *Have carefully selected recommended reads for each year group which are chosen to teach children new vocabulary or new concepts.*
- *Have a daily story time in all classes where children are read to or read to themselves (generally in UKS2).*
- *Celebrate reading weekly with 'reading stars' in our celebration assembly.*
- *Have a well-stocked library which is placed centrally in school and all children have access to.*
- *Work closely with the local library and children enthusiastically complete their summer challenges.*

The scheme used for early reading is 'Bug Club' and Oxford Reading Tree to ensure children have books matched to their reading ability and phonics phase. Children have access to online books matched to their phonics phase that they can read at school or at home.

In KS2, once children have completed to early reading book bands and are competent readers they move on to free reader and have access to their classroom library. Children are guided by staff to make sure they select a suitable book for their age and comprehension level.

Use a mixture of guided reading, individual reading and whole class reading. Teachers read to children and model reading aloud during shared reading, changing the intonation in their voice and pausing for punctuation. Teachers are enthusiastic about reading and engage children and aim to foster a love of reading for pleasure.

We encourage parents to read regularly at home with their children. Communication is key and reading is recorded by parents, teachers and children in their individual reading record. Children who read three times are awarded a reading star and reading stars are celebrated weekly in our Friday assembly.
